St. Stanislaus Kostka Catholic Church was founded in 1874 by Polish immigrants eager to share their Catholic faith while celebrating their Polish heritage.

Today, St. Stanislaus parish has a membership of over 1500 families. Nearly 4500 people participate in Mass, church activities, religious education and other gatherings each month.

The parish mission is to be "a welcoming people, living out our Catholic faith in response to the love bestowed on us in Jesus Christ".

## Parish Campus Project Benefits

The Parish Campus project was begun to address a gap between the needs of the Parish family and the facilities available to us. Our new Parish Center will meet the needs of a growing parish.

### PARISH OFFICES

The new center will provide secure, functional office space, including dedicated space for the Parish nurses.

### MEETING SPACE

Sufficient, modern meeting space will help the organizations of our parish collaborate more effectively, supporting the work of these groups.

### LIBRARY

The new library will provide resources for growing in faith & nurturing a sense of community.



### BANQUET HALL

The new Parish hall will support large gatherings, including the Parish picnic, funeral luncheons, senior gatherings, and banquets which previously required renting private spaces at a cost of thousands of dollars per year.

### LANDSCAPING

The closing of Grant Street and the subsequent landscaping will provide a safe, accessible area for students and parishioners

### PARKING

Demolition of the existing high school building will add needed parking for the parish. The number of handicap parking spaces will also be increased.

### THE FUTURE

Future phases of the Campus Project will add front-entrance handicap accessibility and air-conditioning to the church, ensuring a more inviting environment and promoting attendance, especially in summer.

## Project Milestones

### SPRING 2000

Prompted by problems with the existing Parish Center, Parish begins evaluating the status of the building. Over \$1.2million in necessary repairs are identified

### FALL 2000

Parish begins assessing the needs of the various parish organizations, lay ministers, and staff.

### NOVEMBER 2000

Building Committee formed to determine whether to renovate or build new.

### SPRING 2001

Wakely & Associates are chosen to investigate possible renovation.

### SUMMER 2001

Study reveals need for additional 31,000 sq ft of Parish Center space.

### NOVEMBER 2001

Capital Campaign Committee formed.

### FEBRUARY 2002

Based on study, Parish leadership decides that building is the most cost effective, functional solution.

### FALL 2002

First Capital Campaign begins to raise sufficient funds to start construction.

### FALL 2002-SPRING 2007

Committee works with Wakely & Associates to develop plans for Center.

### FALL 2006

Campaign reaches \$2million. Committee begins finalizing plans for construction.

### MARCH 2007

RC Hendrick selected to construct new Parish Center.

### APRIL 2007

Construction begins

### FALL 2007

Second Capital Campaign begins.
